Now that riding a motor cycle or scooter without protective headgear is illegal, I would like, through the medium of your publication, to put out a plea to riders of horses and ponies to consider the wisdom of this ruling.

With prices of animals falling they have become available in ever increasing quantities and I am horrified, at the number of children and adults seen on roads and bridle-paths without the correct riding hat.

Of course, everyone is entitled to kill themselves in their own way, but even the quietest of horses can be frightened by so many various things that I think this ruling should be extended to cover horse riders.

May I point out also that apart from the danger to children riding without proper headgear, the owner of an animal involved in an accident can be liable for substantial damages.

I would urge all parents, who care about the safety of their children, not to allow them to ride anywhere at any time without correct headgear.

Christians from several churches in the Lingfield/Dormansland area have recently been meeting together for discussion and prayer. HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW YOUR PARISH CHURCH?

For instance, did you know that Lingfield Church is possibly a rare example of a "double-naved" church, one nave for the Collegiate, one for the parishioners and that a proud bellfounder inscribed five of the eight bells, "Brian Eldridge made mee 1648".

Have you seen the carved misericords under the choir stalls (would you know one if you saw one?) Do you understand why these seats are made to tip up and what ingenious purpose the ledge underneath was designed to serve?

Can you name the sleepers in the four remarkable table tombs; the distinguished knight who fought with the Black Prince and was later made Admiral of the Fleet, and Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the charming lady, who directed in her will that she should be buried in Lingfield Church, "where my dear heart and late husband lyeth".

Where would you look for the animal with a wolf's head and body, with black feet webbed like a duck or the winged dragon, which also have their places within the church.

Which prosperous Lingfield resident donated the beautiful brass chandelier in 1754? Was it to impress his neighbours with his wealth, I wonder, or even to atone. If so, it was a timely gift, as he died soon after the gift was made.

REPORT FROM:

Joy Goodman, Chairman, Lingfield Parish Council

Many people think it is 'something to do with the church.' While in origin this was true, the Parish Council of today is part of local government and as such is more involved in all aspects of local affairs than ever before. Whether it be in matters of significant importance such as planning applications for new housing or shop developments, street lighting, public transport, road safety or education then the Council is involved or represented. It is similarly concerned with more local issues such as the care and maintenance of foot - paths, tree preservation and, providing the lights for the trees at Christmas time.

The Parish of Lingfield covers an area of some 9240 acres, has a population of approximately 7,700 and has just under 3,000 rateable properties. The Parish Council proportion of the total rates charged to you is about 2% or less than £1 per head of the population of the Parish. This amount is largely spent on providing funds for such local amenities as street lighting and giving financial support to the Churches for upkeep of burial grounds.

There are 12 Councillors on the Parish Council; six represent Lingfield, 4 Dormansland and 2 Baldwins Hill. The Council is in the final year of its 3 year term of office, local elections being due to be held on Thursday 6 May next.

Meetings of the Parish Council are held at Lingfield Guest House, (Lingfield Library), and are open to the public. Dates and times of Council and Committee Meetings are given on notice boards which are located in Lingfield, by the shops in East Grinstead Road and at the Victoria Memorial Institute; in Dormansland at the Recreation Ground and in Baldwins Hill at the entrance to Lowdells Lane and at Felcourt Stores.

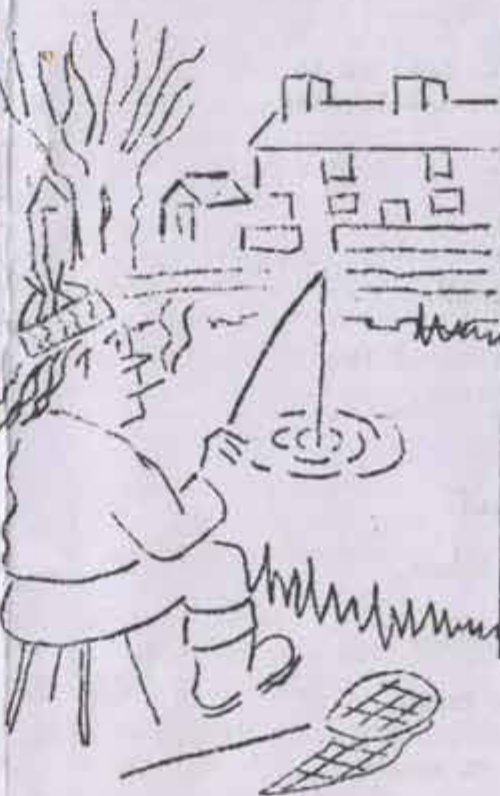

WHY NOT MAKE YOUR OWN HOT CROSS BUNS THIS EASTER?

TRY THIS EASY RECIPE - Makes 16 Buns

2 eggs	$\frac{1}{2}$ teasp. salt
1 oz. yeast	1 level teasp mixed spice
$\frac{1}{2}$ pint milk and water	1 " " Cinnamon
3 oz. Soft Margarine	$\frac{1}{2}$ " " Ground cloves
3 oz. Caster Sugar	4 - 6 oz currants
1 lb. Strong Flour	2 oz. Chopped Peel

Glaze 2 oz. sugar

4 tablespoons water

Pastry crosses

Method

1. Break eggs into measuring jug. Make up to 7 oz with milk and to $\frac{1}{2}$ pint with hot water.
2. Dissolve yeast in this liquid.
3. Pour in bowl and add butter.
4. Add sugar, flour, salt and spices.
5. Mix together thoroughly - beat until the mixture leaves sides of bowl clean.
6. Knead well for 10 minutes.
7. Leave to rise for about one hour.
8. Knock back - add fruit and re-knead.
9. Leave to rise again for 30 minutes.
10. Divide dough into 16 and shape buns.
11. Place on greased tray and put on crosses.
12. Bake in oven 425° Gas mark 7 for 15 minutes.
13. Brush with glaze while hot.

LETTER FROM: K.A. Thomsett, 1 Town Hill Lingfield.
